Message about the Executive Committee Chair Judge Bert Cobb

Hays County Judge Bert Cobb was elected chair of the Executive Committee for calendar year 2017 at CAPCOG's first meeting in January. Although health concerns have kept Judge Cobb from attending meetings since July, he got us off to a great start this year. He introduced his idea for a Water Exploratory Committee at the February meeting – an effort to share information and learn about programs that will contribute to good water management practices as well as cooperation and coordination among stakeholders. Although he is missed at the meetings, we've continued under the

leadership of former Burnet County Judge Donna Klaeger. As chair, he provided staff with his insight and guidance for our five-month budget process commencing in March and the adoption of strategic plans for both the Homeland Security Program and the Capital Area Emergency Communications District. While he has been missed by staff and board members, we look forward to having him back in January.

Message from the Executive Director Betty Voights

APCOG's 2016-17 year was influenced significantly by our construction project involving building out 17,000 square feet of new office space then renovating the 33,000 square feet of existing space; as this annual report is issued, we are still completing the expanded 9-1-1 back-up center shared by Austin, Travis County, and the other regional partners who may need alternative call-taking space if their own center is not operational. The project also provides additional training and meeting space and has allowed more law enforcement and emergency communications training.



The Homeland Security and Emergency Communications divisions completed new strategic plans during the year to identify regional capacity necessary to carry out their missions and provide a foundation for funding decisions going into fiscal year 2017-18. Our Aging Services Division doubled outreach this year with more health & wellness fairs, special events, and training while covering a range of issues from medication management, grandparents as caregivers, Medicare enrollment, and general benefits planning. CAPCOG lost its Air Quality Program funding as the Legislative Session wound down, but in the best example of regional cooperation and dedication to attainment, the Clean Air Coalition members of cities and counties are keeping the program going for another year to support the Ozone Advance Plan adopted in 2013. The Planning & Economic Development Division finished a disaster recovery project for the 2015 floods; a key component was the use of FEMA's HAZUS model to project future flood-prone areas that might not be reflected on FEMA's floodplain maps. With the frequency of increasingly severe flooding in recent years, our GIS staff will continue to offer flooding mitigation mapping to our local governments. Finally, for the first time CAPCOG staff managed an "exploratory committee" to encourage coordination and information sharing - this year's topic was water selected by Chair Bert Cobb, Hays County Judge. Thanks to those who have commended us for trying to bring stakeholders together on an important regional issue.



CAPCOG serves a ten-county region spanning more than 8,400 square miles and consisting of Bastrop, Blanco, Burnet, Caldwell, Fayette, Hays, Lee, Llano, Travis and Williamson counties. As a regional partner directed by local governments, it assists jurisdictions on regional planning in the areas of emergency communications, aging resources, law enforcement education, criminal justice, solid waste management, air pollution reduction, homeland security, transportation, economic development and GIS data collection and usage. CAPCOG coordinates and facilitates collaboration among local, state and federal officials on the same topics, and it seeks out opportunities for regional cooperation that eliminate any unnecessary duplication of cost among its members — counties, municipalities, school districts, chambers of commerce and other organizations — by purchasing regional tools to be used and implemented locally. It's more than 100 members, empower CAPCOG's programs to assist in providing and improving services to more than 2.1 million residents, about 7.7 percent of the state's population.

Administrative Services

Administrative Services supports CAPCOG's program divisions by providing expertise in finance, human resources, membership, information technology, compliance and procurement services.

Planning and Economic Development provides support by compiling and interpreting data, by guiding strategic local and regional planning and by supplementing the technical skills and capabilities of local communities' staff.



Economic Development

The Economic Development Program in 2017 re-launched the Data Points newsletter as a blog at Datapoints.org. The updated format allows for more freedom in presenting data, including the use of interactive data visualizations that allow the reader to customize the presented data. Posts on the site this year analyzed youth employment, the spatial distribution of workforce development resources, and the local food economy, among others.

Additionally, the Economic Development Program completed a study about flooding impacts and the region's flooding resiliency following the 2015 Memorial Day rain events. Using modeling software called HAZUS, Planning and Economic Development compiled maps and estimates corresponding to flood vulnerabilities in differing scenarios. The intent is for this exercise to further support continued resiliency planning throughout the region in years to come.



Geographic Information Systems (GIS)


The GIS Program continues to coordinate with various stakeholders and implement the advanced technologies necessary for transitioning the current 9-1-1 system to national standards associated with Next Generation 9-1-1. Monthly updates to the core 9-1-1 data continues to provide near perfect accuracy for matching address points to landlines. The GIS Program trained several new county addressing coordinators this year, using a combination of documented tutorials, instructional videos, and in-person trainings to ensure local addressing coordinators provide accurate data to the 9-1-1 database.

The GIS Program also modernized its web portal, where the team offers geospatial data for the region. Using ArcGIS Online and the Open Data app, the portal more effectively distributes regional GIS data to regional stakeholders and the general public. The data is free and can be viewed online or downloaded for use in many GIS-based applications.

Regional Transportation


In partnership with Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), CAPCOG arranged meetings with counties outside of the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) area to strengthen local input in rural transportation planning. Five different meetings in three rural counties, which featured input from local officials as well as the general public, provided TxDOT with more varied feedback for planning purposes than prior years.

CAPCOG also continues to administer the Capital Area Regional Transportation Planning Organization, which convenes elected officials from across the ten-county region to coordinate transportation priorities and policy issues. The group provided regional feedback on issues ranging from TxDOT's Freight Mobility Plan to state policies on heavy trucks on county roads in the past year.



Criminal Justice

CAPCOG administered about \$12.8 million in criminal justice grants to 41 projects during 2017 for fiscal year 2018 on behalf of the Office of the Governor's Criminal Justice Division. The grant categories included Justice Assistance, Juvenile Justice, Victims Services, and Victims Services in the specific case of Violence Against Women. To prioritize the projects, CAPCOG sought community stakeholder's input, produced a Criminal Justice Strategic Plan, held multiple application workshops, and convened application scoring meetings. The Criminal Justice Program started planning for 2019 funding in 2017 by seeking plan input from a larger pool of community stakeholders. The program also promoted other Office of the Governor's Criminal Justice Division grants to local jurisdictions as they became available.

Air Quality

The Air Quality Program helps maintain and improve the region's air quality through research, planning, and outreach activities. Research projects in 2017 included continuing ground-level air pollution monitoring; measuring above-ground pollution with balloons; analyzing 2016 air pollution and metrological data; and modeling local, state-wide and country-wide emission contributions to regional air pollution levels.

The program continued its Air Central Texas public outreach campaign to include managing AirCentralTexas.org, social media accounts, electronic advertising, and a regional award program. In 2017, the program also oversaw the implementation of projects that were awarded regional air quality grants in 2016, which support the Regional Ozone Advance Program Action Plan's goal to reduce emissions. Grant projects included:



- Austin Community College installing solar panels at its Highland Campus
- Austin White Lime installing equipment to improve the energy efficiency of its primary kiln
- Austin White Lime replacing pickup trucks with low-emission off-road utility vehicles
- City of Austin developing a tool to promote alternative commuting for its employees
- Travis County providing subsidized van-pooling for its employees.

Following the loss of state funding for the program during 2018-2019, jurisdictions participating in the Clean Air Coalition of Central Texas stepped up to raise \$287,000 to help CAPCOG continue its monitoring activities and some of its outreach, research, and planning activities through FY 2018.

Commute Solutions

The Capital Area Metropolitan Planning Organization transferred the Commute Solutions program to CAPCOG in March 2017. The program promotes alternatives to single-occupancy vehicles commuting and rush hour commuting in the region to reduce congestion, decrease pressure for new road construction, and protect the environment. CAPCOG established a steering committee consisting of local governments, nonprofits and transportation providers to guide the program and re-establish a broader coalition of organizations interested in the program. CAPCOG




also conducted targeted advertising campaigns, started an incentive program to encourage residents to take alternative commutes, and promoted the program through Commute Solutions' social media accounts and Commute Solutions.com.

Solid Waste

The Solid Waste Program supports implementation of the Regional Solid Waste Management Plan through grant oversight and planning activities. The program supported implementing several state grants awarded in 2016 for the 2016-17 biennium; projects funded this year included:

- a new permanent household hazardous waste facility in Smithville, a joint effort between Bastrop and Lee counties
- waste collection events in Blanco, Burnet, Caldwell, and Llano counties
- the purchase of waste handling equipment, including hundreds of recycling and composting bins for Austin Independent School District, a pharmaceutical waste kiosk in Georgetown, illegal dumping surveillance equipment for the City of Llano, and a forklift for a recycling/collection station in Hays County.

The Solid Waste Program hosted a series of workshops and law enforcement training courses to improve local solid waste planning, management and enforcement.





Community Economic Development Assistance Fund

The Community Economic Development Assistance Fund Program supported the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program within the region. CAPCOG's efforts focused on medium- and smaller-sized communities, or "non-entitlement" jurisdictions, that do not receive CDBG grants directly. In addition to the routine technical assistance CAPCOG provided to these communities, CAPCOG assisted TDA with scoring the region's FY 2017-18 grant applications for Community Development funding and later convened a Regional Review Committee meeting to review the results of the scoring and previously awarded CDBG funds.

Water Exploratory Committee

The Executive Committee established a Water Exploratory Committee in early 2017 to promote coordination and awareness of water issues within the region. The committee met four times during 2017 bringing in experts from the Texas Water Development Board and around the region to provide information on the development of the state water plan, trends in water demand, groundwater management, and conservation and reuse.

The Area Agency on Aging of the Capital Area (AAACAP) offers an array of services to older adults and their caregivers to ensure individuals can maintain good health, safety and independence in their homes and communities.

AAACAP doubled its efforts in 2017 to increase outreach opportunities across the ten-county region focusing on hard-to-reach and potentially at-risk older adults, caregivers and individuals with disabilities. Connecting to community gatekeepers means older adults know where and how to access services and supports needed to successfully age in place in their choice community.

To complete this task, AAACAP worked with more partners to conduct outreach efforts at public events, but it also increased its social media presence providing a wider range of access to older adults and their caregivers. One successful social media campaign about fall prevention ran for two weeks significantly raising awareness about programs and services that reduce the risk for falls. Managed by the Health and Wellness Program, it received positive feedback for bringing attention to Falls Prevention Awareness Day 2017.

Ombudsman

The Ombudsman Program, which advocates for residents in nursing homes and assisted living communities, provided input for policy changes at the local, state and national levels to promote improved care and quality of life for such residents. During the year, the Ombudsman Program made more than 2,000 visits to nursing homes and assisted living communities consulting with residents, families, facility management, and state regulatory surveyors to provide mediation and complaint resolution for issues regarding residents' rights.

Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC-CAP)

ADRC-CAP continues to receive a high volume of calls, the fourth highest of the 22 state's ADRCs, assisting older adults and individuals with disabilities with connections to long-term services and supports. This year ADRC-CAP strengthened its community partnerships and provided highly valued cross-training events highlighting best practices, gap-filling service delivery and increased referral coordination. ADRC-CAP held its first annual Advocacy Training for steering committee members to recognize their contributions in finding community-based support solutions for all individuals. Attendees acknowledged ADRC-CAP's importance as a key network convener and training coordinator for a variety of service providers across the aging and disability network.

ADRC-CAP successfully implemented its third year of the Lifespan Respite Care Program, which provides family caregivers caring for individuals of all ages increased access to consumer-directed respite vouchers and adult daycare to assist in emergency or urgent situations.

ADRC-CAP continues to work with the Planning and Economic Development Division to build an interactive housing inventory and support expanded opportunities for developing affordable and accessible housing for older adults and individuals with disabilities.

Health and Wellness

Throughout the year the Health and Wellness Program focused largely on efforts to expand its offerings of evidence-based, disease self-management classes. With new federal grant funding provided in partnership with the Texas A&M Center for Population Health and Aging, AAACAP increased capacity to implement existing programs and introduced the new Chronic-Pain Self-Management Intervention. Additional volunteer coaches from Austin Regional Clinic, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension and Family Eldercare are working to establish new classes at a variety of local community-based venues.

Care Coordination and Caregiver Support

The Caregiver Support Program increased the number of its consumers who reported a high level of satisfaction with the program's services and more importantly consumers recognized respite care's value in providing much needed rest and relief that enables caregivers to return to caregiving feeling refreshed and renewed. In partnership with Alzheimer's Texas, AAACAP provided an increased number of caregiver education and training events in the region's rural counties.

The Care Coordination unit's in-home health maintenance program increased its number of health and safety solutions to older adults. Easter Seals, Inc. worked closely with AAACAP to provide life-changing hearing screenings and more assistive devices to a significant number of people, prompting one consumer to say his new hearing aids were a "dream come true."

Other AAACAP Activities

The Nutrition Programs, Transportation and Senior Center Operations played key roles in reducing food insecurity and social isolation.

AAACAP supported local community programing for older adults, caregivers and individuals with disabilities by attending a Williamson County Intergenerational Family Fun Day, guiding the Buda Task Force on Aging, and participating in the development of the Age Friendly Austin plan.

Benefits Counselors presented information about accessing public benefits, such as Medicare and Medicaid, and pertinent consumer rights topics, such as senior fraud, consumer protection, long-term care and disability programs, to numerous community partners.



The Medication Safety Program developed new partnerships with senior housing communities, healthcare clinics and nonprofits to increase the amount of safety consultations and promote safe medication management. The program, supported by the St. David's Foundation, serves Bastrop, Caldwell, Fayette, Travis and Williamson counties.

The Regional Law Enforcement Academy (RLEA) has served the area's law enforcement training needs for 22 years providing classes for basic peace officer certifications, basic county corrections officer training, basic telecommunicator training, and peace officer in-service and mandated training.

RLEA's Basic Peace Officers Course (BPOC) is an academically intense 25-week academy covering 54 subjects going beyond the state's requirements. The additional subjects help graduating cadets be more well-rounded peace officers, fulfill newly required legislative mandates, and educate them on issues important to the region's law enforcement agencies. Cadets train not only in the class room but receive practical experience through scenario training, such as that used inside CAPCOG's Use of Force Simulator, to enhance verbal skills, de-escalation skills and decision making. RLEA facilitated BPOCs through FY 2017.






RLEA works with experienced veteran instructors to assist local peace officers in maintaining their Texas Commission on Law Enforcement (TCOLE) licenses and obtaining training certificates to advance their careers. Since 2017 concluded TCOLE's four-year cycle, many officers needed required classes. To meet their demand, RLEA scheduled numerous last minute classes and not only trained the region's local officers, but officers from cities around the state including El Paso, Lubbock, Tyler, Houston, and Corpus Christi. RLEA seeks course input from officers and agencies and often schedule classes based on requests. RLEA



also worked with local agencies to report training that they cannot report without an academy license.

Homeland Security supports and promotes regional preparedness and readiness to natural and man-made disasters throughout the ten-county region with a variety of programs, trainings, exercises, and planning developments.

During 2017, Homeland Security delivered training classes on hazardous materials, disaster finance and accounting, incident command, and wide area search and rescue. Its largest training workshop included discussing issues related to effective planning before, during, and after disasters to assist the elderly, youth, people with functional and access needs, and ethnically diverse populations. A workshop entitled Homeland Security Information Sharing built a fundamental understanding of key concepts and practices needed for an effective information sharing program to increase cybersecurity efforts regionally.





As part of a region-wide educational campaign, CAPCOG communities doubled the number of self-registered cellphone numbers and email addresses to receive emergency alerts from local jurisdictions. A regional press conference kicked off the month-long campaign which contributed to about 60,000 more residents registering at WarnCentralTexas.org to receive the alerts. WarnCentralTexas.org was enhanced to promote such registrations and serve as a resource for residents to discover how their communities distribute emergency information.





The division also established a new strategic planning framework that defines the capacity and resiliency to support emergency preparedness, efficient disaster response, recovery, and long-term economic sustainability for the region's communities. It identified significant hazards to the region's population and economy and several training and planning areas to positively impact response and recovery if those hazards occurred.




The division completed installation of a backup fiber network to 15 of the 27 locations that house the region's PSAPs during the second year of a three-year project. The backup network enhances a PSAP's ability to continue operations and eliminates the need to reroute calls to a nearby PSAP when the primary network is not available due to scheduled maintenance or an unplanned outage.


Emergency Communications finished installing and testing Text to 9-1-1 making the service available region-wide in September thus enabling cellphone users to send simple text messages to PSAPs in situations when they cannot speak. However, texting is a "best effort" service by cellphone providers, so residents should "Call if you can, text if you can't." The division developed an educational campaign to inform residents about the limitations and best practices for using Text to 9-1-1 services including three public service announcements.



Division staff also managed expansion of the Regional Backup Center PSAP and 9-1-1 Training Center, adding 19 to the 31 call-taking positions of Austin and Travis County, 20 new positions for regional use and increasing by one-third the training capacity. The expansion space will be operational after additional planning and installation of equipment and operational systems. Working with its advisory committee, the division also completed a strategic plan for the Capital Area Emergency Communications District, which is the funding mechanism for CAPCOG's emergency communications program.






